Travelling to Gibraltar?

If you have only been in countries or territories on the green list in the 14 days preceding your arrival in Gibraltar, you must book a free COVID-19 lateral flow test before arriving in Gibraltar. The test must take place within 24 hours of your arrival. If you are remaining in Gibraltar for more than 7 days, you must also take a second test on day 5. You do not need to provide evidence of vaccination, or selfisolate.

Port: what's it all about? PART 4

So what's it going to be: Ruby, Tawny ... or do you in fact have slightly more choice? Port does come in several styles, all of which are regulated by the *Institute of Douro and Port Wine*. And when is a Port not a Port? Well, according to the *European Union Protected Designation of Origin* guidelines, <u>only Portuguese wine</u> can be labelled "port" or "Porto." However, *Port-style wines* are also produced in countries like the US, Australia, Argentina, Canada, India, Spain, and South Africa. A winemaker of *Port-style wine* cannot label it as "Port" (unless made before 2006), but the wine may be named after a *Port style*. So, something labelled "Tawny" was probably made similar to a Tawny



Port, and has been long aged in a cask.... but it's not Port! So what choices do you have for the Sapper Special? Sit back – top up your glasses – unwrap your Stilton – pick your crackers – scan the room to find HRH's location – and choose a wee tipple of either: **Ruby Port** (including Reserve Ruby Port) **Tawny Port** (including Colheita Port) **White Port Rosé Port Vintage Port Single Quinta Vintage Port Late Bottled Vintage Crusted Port** (sometimes called Vintage Character Port) **Garrafeira Port**

Confused....? No problem – check our next newsletter for more info, starting with our traditional *Ruby* ... and of course if you are not too sure which type of Port to drink, you really should purchase a bottle of each ... purely for research purposes only, of course!!!

Sgt Maj Henry Ince (part 1)

Henry Ince (1736–1808) was a Sergeant-Major (and later Lieutenant) in the British Army who achieved fame as the author of a plan to tunnel through the North Face of the Rock of Gibraltar in 1782, during the Great Siege of Gibraltar. As a result of his work, by the end of the 18th century Gibraltar had almost 4,000 feet (1,200m) of tunnels in which dozens of cannons were mounted overlooking the isthmus linking the peninsula to Spain.

Ince spent most of his life in the Army and served for 36 years in Gibraltar before retiring to Devon four years before he died at the age of 72.

Born in Penzance in Cornwall in 1736, Ince first worked as a nail-maker, before turning his hand to mining. He enlisted in the 2nd (The Queen's Royal) Regiment of Foot in 1755 and served in Galway, Ireland. The Regiment remained in Ireland until June 1765, when it was posted to the Isle of Man. It was subsequently sent to Gibraltar in March 1768, where Ince was able to put his mining skills to use.

According to Gibraltarian Methodist tradition, the colony's first regular Methodist meeting place was Ince's old home on Prince Edward's Road – a claim which is made on a plaque that was originally mounted in the Methodist Church on Prince Edward's Road and is now in the modern Gibraltar Methodist Church on Main Street.



He was one of the first members of the Soldier Artificer Company and rose to be the Company's senior non-commissioned officer. On 26 June 1772, Ince joined the Army's first unit of military artificers and labourers, the Soldier Artificer Company, and was promoted to Sergeant on the same day. The Company was established by Lieutenant Colonel William Green to assist his programme of improvements to the fortifications of Gibraltar.

Ince was posted to the fortress in 1761 as its Senior Engineer and in 1769 he put forward improvement plans which were eventually approved. The works were initially carried out by civilians recruited from England and elsewhere in Europe, but this proved slow, expensive, and unsatisfactory. To resolve these problems, Green was authorised to raise a 68-man company more to follow next month in Part 2!

PLAQUE CHAT

Keightley Way connects Rosia Road at Little Bay to the Ibrahim-al-Ibrahim Mosque and Nun's Well at Europa Point. Dug in 1960 by 1st Fortress Sqn RE, it was the last surface tunnel to be built in Gibraltar. The tunnel was originally




designed to take a two-lane road with sufficient space for pedestrians, although now it is one-way and only carries traffic southbound to Europa Point. It was named after General Sir Charles Keightley who was the Governor of Gibraltar at the time.
