"Royal" NAAFI in Gibraltar

The NAAFI has been granted permission to use the title 'Royal', in recognition of its close links to Royalty and the military. The organisation was established in 1920 when the then Secretary of State for War, Winston Churchill, set up a committee to oversee organisation of the armed forces' canteens following World War I.



King George VI was the NAAFI's original patron until his death in 1952 at which point Her Majesty took over the role. The organisation also provided service onboard the Royal Yacht Britannia throughout its commission. CEO of NAAFI **Steve Marshall** said: We are truly thankful to receive the Royal title and we aim to repay this honour by continuing our excellent support to our Armed Forces as we begin our 2nd century of operation.

NAAFI operates several facilities in Gibraltar; both **Helm Point** and **Devil's Tower Camp** are overlooked by the
Rock, and very shortly, NAAFI will also open a coffee

Gib International Airport, IATA: GIB

Gibraltar International Airport (formerly North Front Airport) serves as the air transport link to the Rock. The airport was established in 1939 during World War II as an emergency landing base for the British Navy.

The airport is located at the northern end of Gibraltar near the border with Spain and serves over 300,000 passengers per year. Owned by the Ministry of Defence, it is operated by the Government of Gibraltar and is used for both civilian and military operations. It also serves as Gibraltar's RAF base.



It had very limited facilities with just ten check-in counters, one baggage carousel, a security gate and two departure gates. Proposals for construction of a new terminal building were therefore discussed.



€85m (\$113m) passenger terminal commenced in 2007 and construction was started in 2009. The first phase of the terminal building, that handles all the airport arrival operations, was completed by 2011. The new terminal building was fully opened to traffic in September 2012 and the old terminal was closed. The new terminal has the capacity to handle one million passengers each year.

US Nuclear Sub arrives in Gibraltar

Foreign Ministry watches out arrival of another US nuclear submarine to Gibraltar.



The US nuclear submarine USS Florida (SSGN-728) arrived at the Naval Base in Gibraltar for a "routine stopover", but the expected duration of its stay, between 4 and 8 days, suggests that it is not so much a routine stopover for crew rest, as a possible stop for maintenance or repairs.

Navy's Second New Patrol Boat

HMS Dagger has arrived in Gibraltar, while two boats she is helping to replace are decommissioned after almost 30 years of service.



HMS Dagger arrives in Gibraltar

The Royal Navy Gibraltar Squadron has taken delivery of its second new £5m patrol boat. HMS Dagger joins HMS Cutlass (reported in April newsletter) in the role of 'guardians of the Rock', replacing HMS Sabre and Scimitar which operated in Gibraltar's waters for nearly two decades. The two vessels, which have spent almost 30 years in service, were decommissioned during a ceremony at Portsmouth Naval Base on Wednesday.

Sabre and Scimitar's commanding officers both expressed their sadness at seeing the vessels decommission. Commanding officer of Scimitar, Lieutenant Joshua Tyrie, said it was "bittersweet" saying goodbye and that it "tugs on the heartstrings", as HMS Scimitar and Sabre lower the White Ensign for the last time. Team Sabre was proud to have family, friends, and former Ship's Company amongst those joining us.



Dagger and Cutlass will be based at HMNB






Gibraltar's territorial waters, as well as support British exercises and operations in the area.

Before being able to fly the White Ensign, Dagger must undergo a rigorous series of sea trials and safety checks; these trials were recently completed, and **Lieutenant Simon Holden**, HMS Dagger's first Commanding Officer, said it is "an incredibly proud moment for everyone involved in the project". "I am looking forward to putting HMS Dagger through her paces and getting her operational as soon as possible."

Cutlass was handed over last year for trials ahead of being declared fully operational this spring. Dagger and Cutlass are twice as fast as the Navy's Archer Class P2000 fast patrol boats, as well as being smaller and nimbler. They are also equipped with the latest optical and infrared systems, enabling crew to identify and track potential threats at range.







PLAQUE CHAT


Located on Charles V Wall, near TOC H, just down from the Southport Gate, Line Wall Road and at the side of Ince Theatre. The name TOC H is derived from WW1 when Signallers (yuk!) used a different phonetic alphabet to that of today's NATO standard version. Today's phonetic letters, T - Tango and H - Hotel, were known




