This afternoon, Old Park Barracks will be open to the public. There will be various displays and money-raising activities in aid of Army charities. I hope you will all be able to attend.

For the 125 Junior Leaders passing out, today marks a big step in their military careers. After a period of leave they will go to 3 Training Regiment Royal Engineer at Cove where they will undergo 6 weeks further training before reporting to their units. INSPECTING OFFICER
MAJOR GENERAL H R S PAIN CB MC

Major General HRS pain was born at Ulverston, Lancashire, in 1921, and educated at Clifton College, Bristol. He was commissioned into the Reconnaissance Corp during the war and served in North West Europe, where he was awarded the Military Cross. After the war, he served for two years in East Africa and in British Somaliland before joining the 4th/7th Royal Dragoon Guards in Palestine in 1947.

After attending Staff College Camberley in 1951, he served for four years in the Military Operations Directorate in the War Office. In 1955 and 1956, he was back with his regiment in BAOR; in 1957 he returned to the Staff College, Camberley as a member of the directing Staff.

In 1960 he became GS0 1 with the British Army Staff in Washington; 1962 saw him in command of his Regiment in BAOR. After a further year at Camberley he commanded 5 Infantry Brigade in Borneo in 1965, returning to the Strategic Reserve at the end of the emergency.

He attended the 1968 course at the Imperial Defence College, and in February 1969 was appointed Aide-de-Camp to the Queen. In March 1969 he assumed the appointment of BGS in HQ BAOR. In March 1970 he became GOC 2nd Division with the rank of Major-General.

Major-General Pain is married and has two daughters and a son. He lives in Malton, Yorkshire, and his favourite relaxation is horse riding.

CO's REPORT ON THE SUMMER TERM

It has been a busy and successful term. Although we started with our numbers at an all time low of 399 n healthy mid-term intake of 44 helped to boost our strength to over the 400 mark. A total of 32 juniors failed to complete their courses and left during the term.

The Summer Term normally provides us with more widespread activities than the winter term and this year has been no exception. Our main problem has been shortage of numbers which has made the manning of our various sports teams and clubs rather difficult. Nevertheless we have managed to field full regimental teams in all our traditional summer sports and done very well into the bargain. A record of our activities and successes in the sporting field appears elsewhere in this programme. The members of our athletics team deserve a special mention for the three Junior Army records they achieved in the finals at Aldershot in July.

The regiment acted as hosts for two Junior Army sporting events. In the swimming and water polo although we were in both finals we failed to win. However in the Junior Army Sailing, held in Dover harbour, we managed to win the team event and provided the winning and runner up crews in the individual event. The organising of these occasions requires a good deal of hard work and the members of the permanent staff and boys who were involved deserve great credit. A more hair raising event which took place on the first Saturday of the term was the annual Festival of Sport between the twin towns of Dover and Calais. The regiment provided the venue for many of the sports held as well as representing Dover in three events. Old Park was literally swarming with excited cross channel visitors and over 600 of them were fed in the dining hall.

During the term we were visited by General Creighton W Abrams, the Chief of Staff for the United States Army who was on a flying visit to the UK and Europe. Brigadier Alwyn-Foster, the Commander Training Brigade made a farewell visit and his successor, Brigadier Withall, also found time to pay us an inaugural trip just before the end of term. A party of 19 headmaster and careers masters visited us in June for a briefing on the role of the Regiment and job opportunities

in the Royal Engineers. We also played host to 3 parties of schoolboys and to the ACF on a number of training weekends.

On the training side, squadron spent a week at camp at Sennybridge, Otterburn and Fremington. This was a week less than we have spent in the past but unfortunately our new four term course is very concentrated and we were unable to spare more time. The senior course spent a period of two weeks at the RSME completing those parts of their Combat Engineer Course which we cannot easily do here.

Leadership training continued with the number of boys attending both civilian and military outward bound courses. Two regimental leadership courses were run in Wales and a number of boys were able to do dinghy sailing at Netley.

The party of boys who went to Hong Kong in February on Ex Expurgate returned at mid-term and we were able to send three boys to join. 34 Fd Sqn on Ex 'Waterleap' in Canada. The shortness of our new courses will be in the future make it more difficult to take advantage of these opportunities. Perhaps most adventurous of all, our Leadership Wing officer Captain Justin, together with Captain Haskell, entered for the round Britain race in July. Unfortunately there EYC boat 'Contessa Caroline' sprang a leak at the half way point and they were forced to retire.

The regiment continue to be kept in the news thanks to the activities of the band who played at several local engagements and also crossed the Channel twice to Calais and Dunkirk. The gymnastic club having started the term with practically no members rose from the ashes to perform very creditably at a number of functions in the South East and also at Ripon. Their fame has now spread North of the border and they have been invited to spend a considerable part of next summer in Scotland.

This short review barely scratches the surface of the many activities and the considerable amount of training that has been undertaken but does I hope gives some idea of the variety of experience possible in a Junior Leader unit.

We finished the term greatly encouraged by the recent upswing in junior recruiting which will next term bring us an intake of 400 boys, a greater number than we have ever had at one time before.
